"You hold me without touch. You keep me without chains. I never wanted anything so much than to drown in your love and not feel your rain" "Gravity" – Sara Bareilles



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After identifying my 15 favorite movies from the 1980s I am going to try to see what I can do to select my favorite TV shows from that time. However, I am setting a slightly different criteria than I did for films in that the films had to be made during the 1980s and I could have watched them anytime. With television I am going to allow myself to choose series that weren't necessarily made during the 1980s but which I watched during those years when my age range spanned from 5 to 15. As with the films, I am not going to rate them.

Although this series was made back in the 1960s, the original Star Trek has got to rate up there as one of my favorite series that I watched in the 1980s. I used to enjoy watching it so much whenever it was on...Sundays at 9 A.M. or 9:30 on Channel 19, weekdays at 5 P.M. on Channel 64, back to back on Channel 19 with ST:TNG (or following War of the Worlds) on Friday nights...watching videos when I was a freshman and sophomore in high school provided by the teacher who would become Headmaster at my high school years after I graduated...they were very happy memories. The new Star Trek film has helped to reinvigorate interest in Star Trek, particularly the classic series. The philosophical arguments between Spock and McCoy about emotion and logic and Kirk's musings on the nature of humanity are the stuff of legend (even as Kirk as a character is sadly overtaken by the over-the-top persona of William Shatner that has served to distort many people's impressions of who Kirk actually was), and I read many volumes analyzing the themes and ideas present in the show.

Star Trek: The Next Generation was at its prime in terms of its personal impact on me during the 1980s even though it ran well into the 1990s. In some of the later seasons, the show at times got a little tired and brought in writers like Brannon Braga who could write different, more horrific types of stories but who were not able to write the characters just being themselves in a normal fashion, which was what made ST: TNG a success in my eyes – the characters interacting with each other amid seeing the wonders of space. Perhaps it was the fact that in those years, there was not a hundred and one SF shows from which to choose that caused me to await each new episode of ST:TNG that aired during the 1980s with such eager anticipation. Data's exploration of humanity, Picard's solidity and history, Riker's sense of fun...they were all fresh and new and exciting. This all climaxed with "The Best of Both Worlds", the season 3 finale and Star Trek's first cliffhanger of all time, with Picard being taken over by the Borg (which actually aired in 1990 along with some of the latter episodes of season 3).

When the show returned, it would never again seem quite so revolutionary. The Cosby Show and Family Ties cannot be left off this list. They are forever linked together in my memory because they were the two shows that our family (which for most of that time did not include Julie, who had not yet been born!) watched together back to back on Thursday nights and then on Sundays and Thursdays when Family Ties's time slot got moved. Some aspects of the show got tiresome from overuse (the continual "battle of the sexes" between Cliff and Claire Huxtable especially), but it was fun to see the antics of the kids on the Cosby Show and both Bill Cosby and Phylicia Rashad had great comic timing and did amazing expressions! Family Ties may not have inspired as many laughs as The Cosby Show, but it had fine young performers in Michael J. Fox, Justine Bateman, Tina Youthers and Scott Valentine that always made for an entertaining night and at least it avoided the tedious gender politics of the Cosby Show.

Voyagers! is another program that resonated with me greatly. It was a show about a time traveler who went through history and corrected it when it went wrong. However, his guide book was eaten by the dog of the other main character, a 12 year old boy who loved history. The 12 year old boy starts traveling with the man, and they go on to meet many different historical figures such as Teddy Roosevelt, Babe Ruth, Clepoatra, Cicero, Spartacus and others. It helped my curiosity about history to grow and was a great program to watch on Sunday mornings before church.

Star Blazers (known in Japan as Space Cruiser Yamato) was one of the "founding father shows" of Japanese anime and one of my favorite cartoons of all time. The initial continuing story told about how Earth was sending out the Argo, a refurbished World War II battleship out into space to obtain the Cosmo DNA, a device that would free Earth from radiation placed on it by the planet Gamelon and its leader Desslock. The suspense that the series engendered was magnified by the fact that Earth had only one year in which life would still be sustainable and each episode would end with the narrator doing a countdown that there were only____ days left. We got to know and love the characters on the ship, like Captain Avatar, Derreck Wildstar, Mark Venture, Sandor and Nova. The next story series in which the crew of the Argo face off against Prince Zodar and the Comet Empire along with Desslock is also wonderful. I could not get into the 3rd series that did not fit well with the continuity that had been established and also had different actors and actresses providing the voices for the characters. Many years later I was able to connect with Amy Howard (who was the voice of Nova) online and asked her some questions about acting and her work on the show and received some nice responses.


Voltron is another animated series that rates as one of my favorites. It also originally ran in Japan. There was a Voltron series that focused on the explorers who piloted five lions that joined together to form a robot called Voltron that struggled to foil the plans of the evil rulers of the planet Doom. Its episodes were self-contained, but there were also some multi-part stories that were among the best of the show. Its main heroic characters of Princess Allura, Keith, Hunk, Lance, Pidge, and Sven along with good supporting characters like Princess Romelle and Koran and the villains of Prince Lotor, King Zarcon, Haggar, and Queen Merla all caught the viewer's attention. The other Voltron series dealt with many mini-ships (causing it to be coined Vehicle Voltron) that joined together to form a robot, and the mini-ships were piloted by young pilots who served on a large ship called the Explorer that had been sent out to try to find new planets on which people who lived on overcrowded planets could relocate.

The Explorer was captained by Hawkins, and it was largely from his perspective that many of the stories were told. The Explorer was opposed by the Drule Empire, but for the most part, unlike Lotor, Zarcon, and Haggar (who were two-dimensional and power-hungry), the commanders of the Drule Empire were three-dimensional , and there were some baddies to be sure, but there were also Drule commanders, such as their one-time Chief Commander Hazar (who had a conversion experience, like Queen Merla in the other series) who spent much of the series trying to find a way to help the Drules make peace with Galaxy Garrison and its ship the Explorer. Hazar's interaction with other Drule commanders (both supporters and opponents of his position) was a major feature of the series. It had a complexity of storyline almost unheard of in a children's animated series. It is truly sad that Vehicle Voltron has not had the resurgence in popularity in recent years as did the lion Voltron. In the late 1990s a new series of CGI lion Voltron came out, with many of the original actors including Neil Ross (Keith), B. J. Ward (Allura) and Michael Bell (Lance) returning to their vocal roles from 1984-1986.


I was really excited when some of the original Voltron episodes were re-syndicated under the title The New Adventures of Voltron . It was like having a nostalgic trip back to my childhood. I found people online who liked Voltron, and I read Voltron fan fiction online and used to correspond with the writers. I participated in the official online chat room of the show and asked questions of one of the show's writers when he showed up for a live chat session and got some of my questions answered. I even coined the name of a Voltron fan fiction email mailing list focusing on the relationship between Sven and Romelle – either Pollux Palace or Pollux passion –it's been so long ago now, I don't remember which and the group did not get a great deal of messages. I was very excited when the show came back, but the first season of the new CGI show did not live up to the quality of story in the original (in spite of the writer of many of the best original episodes, Marc Handler, being back as story editor). When the local station took it off the air after season one, I did not bother to try to get tapes from the 2nd season. However, a Voltron movie is now in the works , so perhaps that will live up to the legend of Voltron from 1980s.

For the Love of Music: An Interview with Mr. Delbert Williams

I met Delbert Williams on a very pleasent fall Sunday afternoon. He was playing the guitar and harmonica on the bustling street of an indoor/outdoor food market in Cincinnati, OH, called Findlay Markert. One of the first things he said to me was that he likes to look like a blues man. He was wearing a suite and flags decorated his set up. We talked for a little bit and I got a chance to ask him a few questions about street performing.

Mr. Williams sang more than he talked. I am really not sure if he distinguished between talking and singing. You can tell he LOVES music and he loves to make people smile with his music. He made sure to engage with all the people that walked by him. He had a hat for people to drop in money should they want to, and he also had a hat full of balloons and offered them to every child that went by. There were a few times that he would interrupt himself mid sentence during our conversation to say "Give that baby a balloon mamma!" When he credited his mother for his love of music and talked about her gospel singing, he stopped mid sentence to sing a song he said was called "I Won't Complain," that he said his Mamma used to sing to him.



While I was talking to him many people would come up to put a bill in his hat and make a personal request. He played whatever song they asked with a smile. At one point a man walked up and explained that he had seen Delbert Williams play in California and wanted to hear a particular song from that time. As Mr. Williams strummed that song on the guitar, the new eager gentleman sang the words dancing and grinning at the same time.

From the outside, for most, street performing seems like a difficult job. But I didn't hear Mr. Williams complain about anything. My observation was that this man loved music and people, so for him playing on the street was the perfect job. As I was leaving I threw some bills in the black hat on the ground in front of Mr. Williams and thanked him for taking a break to talk to me. He raised his hand to shake mine but at the last second he changed his mind and put out his fist to bump with mine. I bumped his fist and we each parted, only this time, it was me that was smiling.

Here are some of the things that Mr. Williams had to say:

LW: How long have you been a street performer and how did you get started?

DW: I started in a lot of R & B groups. I played with local groups like The Deal, and Mamma's Pride etc. I also went to California and played with a lot of groups out west. As I got older I decided I had to sit down and find a place for myself in music.

My dad used to say to me "Son you have to carry your own weight and do it for yourself." So I kept looking at this pretty guitar for two years and I thought, "What good are instruments if you don't play them?" So I took that guitar down to Fountain Square in Cincinnati and played that guitar, and the response from people in the square was so positive. I got all smiles and no frowns. I learned I could work on my own with out a group, and I could play any song that I wanted instead of being forced to play what the group wanted.

LW: What do you like about Street performing?

DB:I have fun playing pop songs from the 60's. It's entertaining to see a black man play the Beatles. I love to see people's reactions! Everybody has a song in their heart that gives them a good feeling and I like to be part of that. Music is international. The spirit of song is in everyone. My mother and her gospel music is in me. I also like getting paid (pointing to his hat filled with bills and coins). I'd be playing music anyway. But doing this is like going to the "Jeanie," I'm going to go and fill my truck with gas after this!

LW: Do you have any advice for anyone thinking about becoming a street performer?

DB: You gotta have a attitude like you don't wear your emotions on your shoulders because people will say what's on their minds. I had one guy tell me he thought I had a ratty guitar. I could have gotten upset, but I looked at my guitar and thought, "yea this is getting a little ratty." Take people's positive comments and don't get stuck on the negative comments. Also learn a variety of music. People like to hear many different things and you don't want to be stuck in one area. But don't forget to play what's in your heart.



If you are interested in hearing Mr. Williams play, he is not just a street performer. He plays at the Blue Wisp in Cincinnati, every Friday at Midnight. Check him out!


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Inspiration Celebration

Shrimp Fry



Ingredients: Shrimp Salt and pepper Egg Flour and breadcrumbs



- 1. Take off the shrimp shells but keep the caudal fin.
- 2. Cut shrimp back a little and take out the insides.
- 3. Make a shallow cut on the belly side.
- 4. Wipe off the shrimps and season them with salt and pepper.
- 5. Put the flour on the shrimps and dip them into a beaten egg.
- 6. Put breadcrumbs around the shrimp.
- 7. Heat oil up to 180°C/350°F and fry the shrimp.
- 8. Eat them with your favorite sauce like tartar sauce, mayonnaise or tomato sauce etc!


